

What is the GDPR?

The General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR) is a massive data privacy law coming from the EU, designed to give control of personal data back to the individual.

Who Does it Apply To?

GDPR applies to any organization that:

- 0 Offers products or services to any EU resident;
- 0 Is established in the EU;
- 0 Is engaged in widespread website behavioral monitoring.



What are the Penalties?

Penalties and fines are as high as 4% of annual revenue, or €20 million, whichever is greater.

5 Steps in Getting your Website GDPR Compliant

Step 1: Map Your Digital Supply Chain


